Handwriting Example 35

Here is the next page of the letter from the poor widow who had received assistance from the Swedish consul in Chicago, and now is asking for more help.

The first part of this letter was *Handwriting Example 34* in SAG 1/2013.

This letter shows that people had

problems and were getting desperate, and did not know where to turn for help. Maybe people, representing the Old Country, would help? Even if the letter writer had moved from the area, it was still the Swedish consul that was supposed to help this destitute widow. but should be remembered when one has a tricky problem, as they might help. Unfortunately they are only available at the Arninge branch of the *Riksarkivet* (Swedish National Archives).
