Declarations of Intent and Naturalizations of Swedes in Ramsey County, MN 1850-1875

It is well known that immigration into the State of Minnesota began already in 1850 with the appearance of three Swedes in a settlement known as Hay Lake near a place named Scandia in Washington County. These three early Swedish immigrants- Carl August Fernström,¹ August Sandahl² and Johan Oscar Roos³ - had arrived in New York 20 May 1850 aboard the vessel *John* and had gradually made their way to Minnesota. But already before the middle of the century two earlier Swedes had been residing in what was to become the State of Minnesota. According to the 1850 Federal Census - the earliest of them all- Jacob Fahlström⁴, who after working in Canada for the Hudson Bay Company, had crossed the border into the United States, had married an Indian woman in Wisconsin and had ultimately settled in Afton, Washington County. The other Swede listed in the census was Sven Williamson⁵, a musician with the United States Army, posted at Fort Snelling.

As has been demonstrated earlier in the pages of this journal lists of declarations of intent and naturalizations of Swedes have been useful in that they pinpoint the appearance of a certain person at a given place and at a given time. Since these documents are official, they constitute a primary source for proving the existence of an early Swedish immigrant at a certain place and date.

At this time we visit Ramsey County, Minnesota, the county which comprises among other places St.Paul, the state capital, and one of the earliest places of Swedish settlement in the North Star State.

These lists are all the more valuable in that they cite the birth year of the individual who either declared his intent of becoming a U.S. citizen or actually received his naturalization papers. Another useful bit of information we find in the Ramsey County documents is the port of entry for the immigrant. A great number of them, as one would expect, passed through the port of Detroit, MI, indicating that the immigrant in question had arrived in North America via a Canadian port.

For the purpose of this study, the following court records have been examined in the Archives of the Minnesota Historical Society - which houses the microfilms of the Ramsey District Court, The Ramsey Probate Court and the Ramsey Court of Common Pleas. The records examined span the years 1850-1875. Since the national origin of all these persons, except for the first group, was shown to be Sweden, this information has been deleted from the list. For the first group the notation is Sweden/Norway, since these countries constituted a dual monarchy until the dissolution of the union in 1905, the individual listed may be either Norwegian or Swedish.

A mission church was organized there in 1879, and in 1880 Pastor Sundberg was called to be its first pastor. He remained there for six years ... [He] was one of the leaders in the Ansgar Synod from its inception. It was while he was serving as Pastor of the First Mission Covenant church of Jamestown that the Mission Covenant denomination was organized in 1885 ... Pastor Sundberg was chosen to serve on the program and constitution committees at the organization meeting of the denomination. At the first annual meeting in Princeton, Illinois, in September 1885, he was elected to the office of vice-president and served in that capacity for many year. In addition he held many other offices of trust in the denomination ... [He] served the [St. P.] church for over eleven years during which time the church was firmly established and the work progressed. In the fall of 1897, Pastor Sundberg resigned to accept a call to Rockford, Illinois ... [He] served the

Rockford church from 1897 to 1904 and the Ravenswood church in Chicago from 1904 to 1908. The remainder of his life was spent in Minneapolis ... He was almost 69 years of age . when he passed away on April 26, 1911." — FCC; Olsson, p. 797; SPD 1889-90, p. 1263; SPD 1894, p. 1301.

Skogsbergh...[He] left in the fall for Chicago and enrolled in the Chicago Theological Seminary (Risberg's School). He graduated from the seminary in April 1891 as valedictorian ... [He] was married in Chicago 23 April 1891 to Carol Amkvam whom he had met in Norway, and the following day began his first full-time pastorate in Galesburg [IL]. While in this city, he studied at Knox College for three years...Pastor Sundquist resigned from [this] church in 1897 and moved to Mpls. Collaborating with A. L. Skoog, he published a bilingual monthly periodical. Linnea, for young people ... He was called as permanent pastor of the [St. P.] church on 15 April 1898. - 750. Sigfrid F. Wilson, son of Tycho H. and Maria Wilson (see No. 748-749) res. 665 Magnolia Av. (1900) and moved June 1909 to Duluth, St. Louis Co., MN. - FCR; FCY, No. 962;
- 751-752. Alfred Winholtz, shoemaker and prominent Covenant layman, res. 106 Third St. (1869-70). Olsson writes: "The Eastern Parish records in Jönköping show him as born February 6, 1843. He was a cobbler's apprentice living at Smedjegatan 22, in Jönköping, until he

emigrated August 20, 1867." Alfred and his wife moved to Holdrege, Phelps Co., NE on the new railroad that opened up homestead land. — *Olsson*, pp. 134, 197, 799; *SPD* 1869-70, p. 225; *TWW*.

- 753-754. Peter Adolph (P. A.) Winholtz and Charlotta Peterson arr. St. P. in April 1869 and were m. 24 Nov. 1869. They had the following ch. (all b. in St. P.): Anna Deodata, b. 1 Mar. 1871 (see No. 244); Caleb, b. 7 Mar. 1875; Joshua, b. 26 Feb. 1879, d. 26 Nov. 1879; and Edith Grace Charlotta, b. 14 Feb. 1888. The family res. 11 Waverly (1871), 5 Waverly (1873), 49 Preble St. (1879-80), 719 Preble St. (1884-90), and 957 Minnehaha Av. (1894-99). Peter A. was employed as a wagon/carriage maker for the J. H. Schurmeier Co. from 1869-99. Charlotta worked as a servant for General Greene on Lafayette St. in St. P. She was a sister of J. Isaac Cederblom (see No. 163) and Charles Wallblom (see No. 730). Peter A. d. 16 Jan. 1935 in St. P. and was b. at Union Cemetery, St. P. *PCF*, No. 498-499; *SPD* 1869-70, p. 225; *SPD* 1871, p. 213; *SPD* 1873, p. 454; *SPD* 1874, p. 436; *SPD* 1879-80, p. 476; *SPD* 1884-85, p. 824; *SPD* 1889-90, p. 1375; *SPD* 1894, p. 1414; *SPD* 1899, p. 1478; *St. Paul Pioneer Press*, Friday, 18 Jan. 1935, p. 8; *TWW*.
- 755-756. Alfred Wistrom (Wiström) and Charlotta Carlson both arr. St. P. in 1882. They were m. 22 Mar. 1884 and had the following ch. (all b. in St. P.): Ellen Elisabeth, b. 6 Apr. 1885; Milton Fridolf, b. 10 Jan. 1889; Gottie Charlotta, b. 26 Mar. 1891; Ethel, b. 4 July 1893; and Alexander, b. 14 Sept. 1894. Alfred worked as an elevator operator at the Drake Block. The family res. 715 Preble St. (1894) and 792 Fauquier St. (1899) and moved to Fresno, Fresno Co., CA in 1900. Alfred was probably the brother of Anna Wiström Hedberg (see No. 270). FCF, No. 815-816; SPD 1894, p. 1417; SPD 1899, p. 1481.
- 758. Mrs. Clara Albin Youngberg arr. St. P. from Cannon Falls, Goodhue Co., MN in 1887 and res. 660 Sims Av. (1900). FCF, No. 966; FCR.
- 759. Carl Magnus Youngquist (Youngqvist) was pastor of the First Covenant Church of St. P. from June 1875 until the spring of 1876. Olsson writes: "[He] was born in Ljungarum Parish, Jönköping län, February (April) 4, 1851. He lived for a time in Jönköping and left for America on March 9, 1869. Youngquist was an able writer; he edited and published, 1892-93, the monthly Hem-Missionären. He died in 1901." FCC; Olsson, p. 799.
- 760-761. Emil W. Youngquist (Youngqvist), operator at the Minnesota Shoe Co. (1894-99), and his wife Carolina Carlson res. 762 York Av. (1894-99). Emil and Carolina both arr. St. P. in 1888 and were m. 11 Oct. 1890. They had two ch. (both b. in St. P.), Elin, b. 1 Nov. 1892 and Ebba, b. 21 Nov. 1894. Emil W. was probably a brother of Fritz Youngquist (see No. 762). — FCF, No. 672-673; SPD 1894, p. 1434; SPD 1899, p. 1498.
- 762-763. Fritz A. Youngquist (Youngqvist), shoemaker at 54 4th St., m. Charlotta (Lottie) O. Ahl on 7 Oct. 1899. She arr. St. P. in 1879 and worked as a seamstress for Mrs. L. A. Mosher (1889-90) and as a housekeeper at 714 Desoto St. (1899). Fritz was probably a brother of Emil W. Youngquist (see No. 760), and Charlotta was probably a sister of Emil C. Ahl (see No. 2). — FCF, No. 907; SPD 1889-90, pp. 202, 1393; SPD 1899, pp. 213, 1498.
- 764. Lovisa Youngquist (Youngqvist) arr. St. P. from Stockholm, Pepin Co., WI in 1888 and worked as domestic help at 644 Burr St. (1889-90) and 231 Grove St. (1894-99). — *PCF*, No. 789; SPD 1889-90, p. 1393; SPD 1899, pp. 213, 1498.

Book Reviews

History of the Swedes Who Settled in Clay County, South Dakota and Their Biographies by August Peterson. 1988 Reprint of the original 1947 Edition. vii + 383 pp. Cloth. \$19.00 + \$2.50 postage and handling. By the author's own admission, what began in 1930 as an interest in his own ancestry burgeoned into an interest in the writing of historical biographies of neighbors and friends for local newspapers. Peterson eventually assembled his biographical sketches and published them in 1947 as *History of the Swedes Who Settled in Clay County, South Dakota and Their Biographies.* Clay County, for those of you who are unfamiliar with the geography of the upper Midwest, is located in the southeastern corner of South Dakota along the Iowa border, approximately equidistant from Sioux Falls, SD and Sioux City, IA. The author concentrates on those Swedish immigrants who were among the original homesteaders in Clay County which, at the time, was part of the Dakota Territory. In particular, he profiles "persons and their immediate families who first filed and actually obtained patents on their claims or both..." (p. 1).

Swedes Who Settled in Clay County has an enigmatic and potentially confusing organization, a condition that is further aggravated by the lack of a table of contents. Aside from a very brief foreword and introduction (pp. 1-6), the book is divided into two parts. Roughly eighty-five percent of the book (pp. 6-334) is devoted to "Biographies and Histories of the Swedes who First Settled in Clay County, Dakota Territory, in 1868 and Onward." Included in this section are sketches of 223 original pioneer Swedes and their families who arrived between 1868 and the mid-1870s. An index of these pioneers, arranged more-or-less alphabetically by surname, is found on pp. iii-vii under the heading "List of Biographies." A second, smaller section (pp. 336-383) entitled "Appendix or Supplement" contains biographical sketches of 30 families who settled in Clay County from the mid-1870s into the 1910s. An alphabetical index of these later arrivals appears on p. 336. The biographies included in *Swedes Who Settled in Clay County* vary in length from one-fourth of a page to six pages and, not surprisingly, tend to be uneven in scope. In general, however, they are replete with the requisite names, dates, places, and familial relationships.

The value of this book to the family historian probably lies as much in the folksy, almost gossipy, material accompanying many of the author's sketches as in the vital statistics, which one would expect to find included in this type of work. The following examples should serve to convey the richness of this wonderful, anecdotal material: (1) Greta Stina Jacobsdotter died in a prairie fire in the fall of 1870, the first such victim in the Swedish settlement (p. 298); (2) Nils "Five-Drops" Anderson was "a widely known salesman for a medicine that claimed to cure almost everything by taking

a dose of 5 drops" (p. 18); (3) John Peterson Eklund was not only the first midwife of the community but also "one of the finest men that ever lived in the settlement" and "one of the most honest and sincere gentlemen ever known" (pp. 80, 78); (4) Charles "Hog-Charley" Erickson, a bachelor who disliked children and became noted for his large hog farm, was "frugal and nigh a miser" and he "lived a tedious, penurious life..." (pp. 93-4); (5) Charles Isackson developed a reputation for going barefoot while doing his farm work and while walking to church (p. 164); (6) About thirty people who became members of the Dalesburg Baptist Church were baptized in February 1877, after a hole was cut in the ice of a creek (thereafter known as Baptist Creek) near the "dugout" of Lars Augustus Swedberg (p. 190); (7) The dugout built by Anders "Pol-Anders" Olson and his wife was "lined with home-woven linen and this caught fire and everything in it was consumed" (p. 244); (8) Carl Johan Polsson, who is alleged to have taken a pair of shoes from a store in Vermillion was subsequently saddled with the moniker "Shoe-Polsson" (p. 282); (9) Oleana Olson came to the United States in 1853 aboard a sailing vessel loaded with steel bars. During the voyage, a storm "tossed the ship so the steel rails wore a hole in the freighter, and [she] was the first to notice it, and stopped the leak while the captain and crew were notified, or the ship would have gone down" (pp. 321-322); and (10) On 7 October 1881, Katharine Norin Wahlberg, the wife of John Wahlberg, sued for divorce, an action that "stirred the people of the community... because it appears to have been the first divorce action among the Swedes...and it involved the most prominent people in the Lutheran church..." (p. 325).

A cursory analysis of the contents of this book (with reference to only the 253 Swedish pioneers highlighted in the biographies, not their spouses or children) revealed a great deal about its potential utility to family historians with specific research interests. No less that 123 different surnames are found among this group of pioneers and sixty-eight different parishes are listed as their birthplaces. The counties (*län*) with the largest number of these birth parishes include Kopparberg and Gävleborg with 9 parishes each; Östergötland with 7; Jämtland, Jönköping and Kristianstad with 4; and Halland, Kalmar and Malmöhus with 3. Interestingly, eighty-two (32.4%) of the pioneers were born in just four parishes. From three of these parishes in eastern Kopparberg *län*—Svärdsjö, Rättvik and Gagnef---came 27, 16 and 16 Clay County pioneers, respectively. An additional 23 Clay County pioneers were born in Gnarp parish in Gävleborg *län*. (In actuality, forty individuals emigrated from Gnarp Parish in June 1868. Their destinations included three cities in Iowa— Madrid, also known as Swede Point, Des Moines and Council Bluffs—as well as Clay County, SD. — pp. 121-122).

The two notable weaknesses of *Swedes Who Settled in Clay County*—lack of documentation and lack of an index—seem to be inherent in works of this vintage and genre (see my recent review of *Swedish Omaha*—Past and Present in SAG, 12(1992):154-155. These glaring omissions serve to detract from and/or severely restrict the usefulness of this book as a reference for the family historian. For example, I encountered the names of Lindsborg (KS), Omaha (NE) and Madrid [Swede Point] (IA) during my perusal of this book. How often and on what pages were they listed? Under what circumstances and with which individuals were these cities mentioned?

Unfortunately, information such as this must be painstakingly gleaned from the book by the reader. It goes without saying that the prudent researcher will also be required to double-check the veracity of any and all names, dates, places, etc. against original vital records.

In spite of these two obvious and regrettable systemic problems, *Swedes Who Settled in Clay County* fills a necessary and important niche in the discipline and should be part of any serious researcher's library. For many, it could prove to be a veritable gold mine of information. The Dalesburg Scandinavian Association (*Dalsborgs Skandinaviska Förening*) of Vermillion, SD, an associate of The American Swedish Institute of Minneapolis and the Swedish Council of America, is to be commended for sponsoring the reprinting of this valuable work.
